NURSING

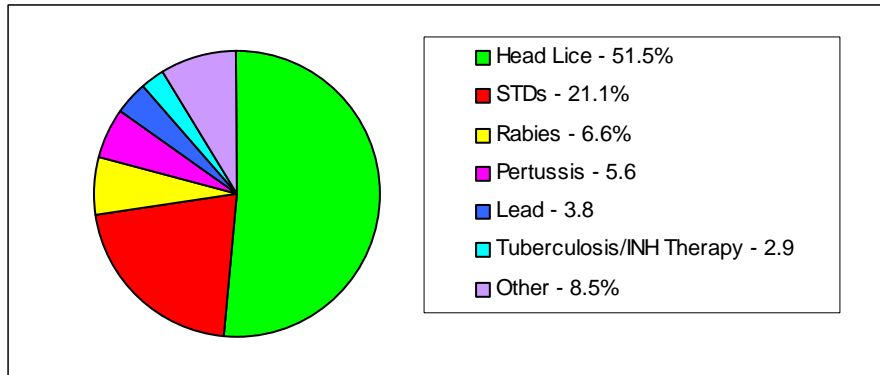
Nursing is defined as "the diagnosis and treatment of human responses to actual or potential health problems". Public Health Nursing is concerned with assisting individuals and families in reaching and maintaining their optimal level of wellness. The nursing staff provides health assessment, education, counseling, and referral in a non-judgmental manner respecting and encouraging an individual or family to make appropriate decisions regarding their own health care and the health care of their families. Services are available to all City residents regardless of race, creed, color, age, religion, or economic status.

Nurses are advocates for the individual or family in the health care system, working cooperatively with other community service agencies. They provide information and support on a wide range of health topics such as parenting, growth and development, nutrition, communicable disease control, prenatal and postnatal care, acute and chronic disease management and immunizations. This year, 6,629 nursing visits were made to or on behalf of individuals or family units.

A summary of nursing services to City of Neenah residents in the past year are included in the following pages.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASE CONTROL

Reducing the spread of communicable diseases requires immediate nursing intervention for identification and treatment. Epidemiological follow-up includes investigation of the cause, appropriate screening and education of contacts, and appropriate reporting of the investigation to the State Epidemiologist.



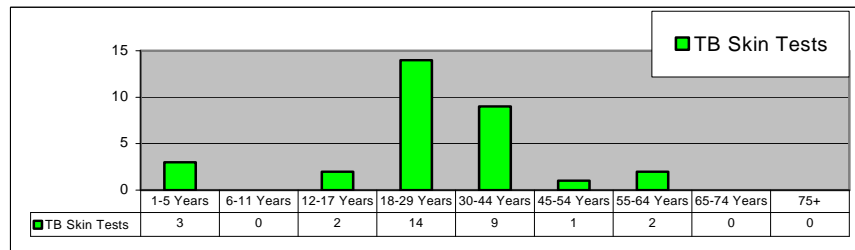
Head Lice (51.5%), Sexually Transmitted Diseases (21.1%), Rabies (6.6%), Pertussis (5.6%), Lead Intoxication (3.8%) and Tuberculosis/INH therapy (2.9%), accounted for 91.5% of the 746 communicable disease investigations completed. Wisconsin Statutes Chapter 252 and Administrative Rule Chapter HSS 145 require reporting of all communicable diseases to the local health officer located in the local public health agency of the patient's residence. (Personnel required to report include physicians, nurses, and infection control personnel in health care facilities, laboratory directors, school principals, and day care directors.) Other communicable diseases reported for epidemiological follow-up can include but not be limited to: campylobacter, mumps, meningococcal disease, etc.

TB CHEMOPROPHYLAXIS PROGRAM

Prophylaxis medication for the prevention of tuberculosis is dispensed at the Neenah Health Department on a monthly basis when prescribed by a local physician. The medication provided by the State Tuberculosis Chemoprophylaxis Program is free. The program requires nursing assessment and monitoring of each client for a minimum of 6-9 months. This reporting year, 6 clients were started on or continued on medication and followed by PHNs.

TB CONTROL - PREVENTION

A total of 31 TB skin tests were administered to citizens this year. Citizens are provided testing on referral, request, or as part of epidemiological follow up of an active case of TB. The total numbers of tests were administered to the following age groups:



Additionally, four health department employees had TB skin tests at the Neenah Health Department.

BLOODBORNE PATHOGENS STANDARDS FOR PUBLIC SECTOR EMPLOYEES

Neenah Health Department employees were trained to protect themselves and others from possible exposure to bloodborne pathogens such as Hepatitis B, Hepatitis C, and HIV through the use of Personal Protective Equipment, Work Practice Controls, Engineering Controls, etc. Hepatitis B vaccination was provided, at no cost, to all those designated to be at risk. Designated employees are immunized with Hepatitis B (3 dose series) as needed upon beginning employment with the City of Neenah. The continued implementation of this standard represents a great deal of cooperative, collaborative effort on all involved departments and will be of long term value to not only City employees but to the community at large. No employees were vaccinated this calendar year.

The number of Hepatitis B vaccines given to city employees is decreasing each year as most new designated employees have received the Hepatitis B vaccine series prior to their employment due to the Wisconsin State Immunization Law which requires all school-aged children receive the 3-dose series.

IMMUNIZATIONS

Immunization Clinics are held in the Department on the third Thursday of every month, with late afternoon hours available 3:00 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. for parents who need these alternate times. Additional clinics are scheduled as needed. This reporting year,

To ensure that the citizens of Neenah receive priority immunization services, Neenah Department of Public Health (NDPH) has reserved clinic appointments exclusively for City of Neenah residents. Immunization Clinics continue to be filled, however, due to staffing and budget cuts, we have had to reduce our annual number of clinics to 11, with limited community clinics available in the months of June and July.

Additionally, one city employee received Td (Tetanus/diphtheria) vaccine to meet the recommended adult vaccination schedule.

AUDITS 2008-2009

The computerized immunization records of all children enrolled in public and parochial schools in Neenah are audited each September and February, with annual reports submitted to the State Division of Health, Immunization Program. In November 2008, of the 7,589 students attending school this reporting year, 7,502 or 98.9% were compliant with State of Wisconsin Immunization Law Requirements. Ten had medical waivers, seven had religious waivers, 212 had personal conviction waivers, and 54 were in process. The computer system continues to save many hours of professional and secretarial time for data collection and analysis, immunization clinic documentation, and physician notification.

CONSOLIDATED CONTRACT GRANTS FROM THE STATE DIVISION OF HEALTH

The City of Neenah Department of Public Health provides numerous services through the application and receipt of Consolidated Contract Grants from the State Division of Health (SDOH), Department of Health and Family Services. The following is a review of the grants applied for and received by the City of Neenah Department of Public Health (NHD) as well as a brief description of the objectives set for each grant. Consolidated Contract Grants total \$77,041 for 2008. At the time of printing of this report, the NHD had fulfilled all requirements of these objectives, having exceeded most objective deliverables.

Childhood Lead

Program Total Value \$4,905

- 1 By December 31, 2008, all children with capillary or venous blood lead levels ≥ 10 mcg/dL who reside in the City of Neenah, will receive follow-up services according to the guidelines in the WI Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention & Control Handbook and WI Statute 254.
- 2 By December 31, 2008, 50% of all new building permit applicants for pre-1950 housing in the City of Neenah, who received the "Lead Safe" educational packet, will have been provided with a follow-up contact.

Immunization

Program Total Value \$9,915

- 1 By December 31, 2008, the Neenah Department of Public Health must be making progress towards the goal of 90% (accomplishment based on the % increase according to the table in the context section). There will be a 2% increase in the percentage of children residing in the City of Neenah jurisdiction who turn 24 months of age during the contract year who have received 4 DTaP, 3 Polio, 1 MMR, 3 HIB, 3 Hepatitis B, and 1 Varicella.

- 1 By December 31, 2008, 26 children ages birth through 7 years from the City of Neenah or the Fox Valley, will be properly positioned in a child safety seat as demonstrated by their parent or caregiver.
- 2 By December 31, 2008, a community-based wheel safety program for children will be implemented by the Neenah Department of Public Health in collaboration with community partners.
3. By December 31, 2008, a crib education program to support safe infant sleep practices will be implemented by the City of Neenah Department of Public Health in collaboration with community partners.

Prevention

Program Total Value \$5,428

1. Contingent upon receiving Preventive Health and Health Services Block Grant (PHHSBG) funding for fiscal year 2008, with no changes in past CDC PHHSBG funding guidance as to the use of these funds, during the contract period initiatives that conform to the Healthiest Wisconsin 2010 State Health Plan and are consistent with the PHHSBG guidelines will be undertaken by the Neenah Department of Public Health.

Preparedness CDC

Program Total Value \$30,233

1. By December 31, 2008, Neenah Department of Public Health will engage in a continuous planning process with local and regional partners to respond to public health emergencies.
2. By December 31, 2008, all staff in the Neenah Department of Public Health will achieve the Emergency Preparedness Core Competencies for All Public Health Workers identified for their position in a public health emergency response.
3. By December 31, 2008, Neenah Department of Public Health will participate in a public health emergency preparedness exercise or real event that meets the requirements set by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC).
4. By December 31, 2008, epidemiology capacity will be increased by the City of Neenah Department of Public Health's development of a local surveillance system which includes an implementation plan for monitoring the community's school or worksite absenteeism.

Preparedness - Pandemic Influenza

Program Total Value \$11,384

1. By July 31, 2008, Neenah Department of Public Health will support pandemic influenza readiness by completing activities defined in the guidance from the CDC.

COMMUNITY NEEDS ASSESSMENT

In 2002, the Fox Cities HealthCare Partnership, made up of Health Officers from the Cities of Neenah, Menasha, Appleton, and Oshkosh Health Departments, as well as from the Winnebago, Calumet, and Outagamie County Health Departments, and representatives from ThedaCare and Affinity Health Care Systems, continue to meet to develop an action plan for community wellness programs. The partnership determined that based on key findings from "Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System in the Fox Cities - Final Report 2001", the greatest area of need for programming in the Fox Cities community is the area of "weight/diet/exercise". This key finding became the key focus of the work of the Fox Cities HealthCare Partnership in 2003.

In 2003, Fox Cities HealthCare Partnership developed the Fox Valley-wide initiative entitled "Walk To Win". The primary goal of "Walk To Win" was to improve community health by establishing the habit of regular exercise among more sedentary community members. "Walk To Win" was a true collaboration from the onset bringing together health organizations, including two competing health care systems as well as public health departments from the Cities of Neenah, Menasha, Appleton, Oshkosh, Counties of Winnebago, Outagamie, and Calumet. The YMCA-Fox Cities was also a vital partner in this endeavor. All focused on making a lasting difference in individuals within our Fox Cities community through a program that would encourage non-participating citizens to develop a life-long habit, one day at a time, through a walking program, over a three-month period. Survey results for 2004 are the following:

These statistics far exceed the original projections for this program for 2003. It's interesting to note that 81% of registrants were female with 18% being male.

In 2004, the Fox Cities Health Care Partnership implemented the 2nd annual "Walk to Win", continuing its focus on adults, but initiating involvement of children, ages 5 to 17 years of age. Children were encouraged to set individual walking goals of 25, 50, or 75 miles in 3 months. If they reached their goal in 3 months, they were eligible for incentives, i.e. T-shirts, as well as grand prize drawings.

In 2005, the Fox Cities HealthCare Partnership implemented the 3rd annual "Walk to Win", continuing its focus on adults and children, but enhancing outreach to school-aged children. Children were again encouraged to set individual walking goals of 25, 50, or 75 miles in 3 months.

With the assistance of the Activate Fox Cities Leadership Group, marketing and outreach efforts were greatly enhanced.

INDIVIDUAL/FAMILY HEALTH PROMOTION/EDUCATION

This area of service extends to all citizens and families not serviced by other public health programs. Nursing intervention is directed toward the development of healthy behaviors within a family and healthy choices leading to a higher level of individual or family wellness. Guidance in the proper utilization of the health care system promotes quality of life and helps to prevent family disintegration in times of crisis.

ELDERLY

Changes in health care services and Medicare coverage restrictions require many older adults to remain at home through serious illnesses or following early discharge from the hospital. The Neenah Public Health Nurses monitor older client's health status, and refer as necessary, for supportive services. This year, 314 contacts were made to individuals 65 years of age and older. Approximately 228 individuals were served.

Quarterly blood pressure and counseling sessions for older citizens, held at Hearthside, Fireside Commons, and the 'Y' Community Center best utilize nursing time and provide assessment and support in health matters. Blood pressure checks were done on 174 older citizens in the above named centers this year.

Forty blood pressure checks were done at the annual "Senior Games" in Neenah in August.

BLOOD PRESSURE SCREENINGS

Blood pressure checks and counseling are provided on a walk-in basis in the Health Department. Blood pressure is monitored for any citizen on request between visits to a physician. Ways to live with hypertension and good general health practices to maintain normal blood pressure and cardiovascular health status are promoted. "Walk-In" blood pressure monitoring was provided to 82 residents this year.

The City employee blood pressure screening program continues. Regularly, the Department makes arrangements to check blood pressures at various City of Neenah sites, i.e. City Garage. Rechecks are available on request and for monitoring between physician visits. Individuals with two successively elevated blood pressures are referred to their physician for evaluation and care. Regular visits are made to the City Garage. This provides an on-site monitoring for known hypertensive personnel and provides access to a PHN for other health concerns or questions. Scheduled blood pressure screenings were provided to 71 city employees this reporting year.

WELLNESS SCREENING

The NHD provided a "Wellness Screening" for 33 city employees. The Wellness Screening is a blood chemistry panel that includes valuable tests such as cholesterol, triglycerides, and glucose. Test results were interpreted and questions answered on an as needed basis. The NHD plans to continue this program in the coming years. Twelve employees/spouses had their blood pressure checked after the blood draw.

Additionally, the NHD provided Influenzae Vaccine Clinics for City employees/adult family members. A total of 80 individuals were vaccinated in the winter of 2008.

INDIVIDUAL/FAMILY HEALTH PROMOTION/EDUCATION (continued)

DENTAL HEALTH

The Neenah-Menasha United Way Dental Board, in cooperation with the Neenah Joint School District provided 2,495 dental screenings for all students in public and parochial schools in grades K, 1, 2, 3 and 4 in 2008. The NDPH Dental Hygienist contacted 185 families to inform them of dental assessment findings. At the time of production of this report, 32 or 18% of those referred, reported completing the recommended dental treatment. The Dental Hygienist follows-up with each one and assists them in utilizing community resources or encourages them to utilize the United Way Dental Clinic funds or the Tri-County Dental Clinic if needed. The NDPH applied for and received SDOH Consolidated Contract Grant funds in 2007 to assist in implementation of this initiative.

COMMUNITY VISION AND HEARING SCREENING PROGRAM

Vision and Hearing Screenings continue to be scheduled in the Department on an as needed basis. This year, two citizens had their vision checked. Abnormal results are reported to citizens and recommendations made for further medical follow-up. This service assists families and individuals in determining whether vision and hearing concerns exist and identifying the need for further care.

SCHOOL HEALTH

SCHOOL NURSING ACTIVITIES (January 1, 2008 to December 31, 2008)

Public Schools

Nursing services are provided to the Neenah Joint School District (NJSD) by a mutually agreed upon contract. The goal of the school nursing service is to promote the optimum level of wellness for all students so that they may participate and succeed in school at their highest level. Nurses work with students, teachers, and parents in obtaining health histories, conducting physical assessments, providing counseling, and education to students about appropriate health practices, including screening for health problems, and following up with parents on possible referrals. School nurses train, supervise, and delegate care provided to medically fragile students, monitor health records, and coordinate communicable disease control measures as needed for student and staff populations. School nurses are involved in an annual immunization audit with the goal of 100% compliance with State Law requirements. School nurses provide annual training to school personnel on first aid and emergency procedures as needed. School nursing programming includes vision and hearing screening as well as related follow-up with parents. 2,714 visits made on behalf of NJSD students. Broken down, that is 830 school visits, 8 home visits, and 970 telephone calls, 749 administrative contacts, and 157 miscellaneous interventions made on behalf of students in public schools. In addition to immunization audits, school nurses provide services that are reflected through various types of reports and multidisciplinary meetings. For the 2007-2008 school year, the school nurses provided multiple services to families of school children in the form of 28 LSSR (Learning Support Services Referrals) and 23 IEP (Individual Educational Plan) meetings or related services. Throughout the school year, school nurses participate in biweekly LSTs (Learning Support Teams) at nine elementary schools and weekly LSTs at Taft Elementary School, Shattuck Middle School, Horace Mann Middle School, and Neenah High School.

Additionally, school nurses provide Bloodborne Pathogens' Standards Training for all new NJSD employees as well as Hepatitis B vaccination (3-dose series) to designated, high-risk employees. Approximately 4 clinics were provided and 8 doses of Hepatitis B vaccine (3-dose series) were given to NJSD employees this reporting year.

Students at Shattuck Middle School, Horace Mann Middle School, and Neenah High School have the opportunity to "drop in" or sign up to see school nurses regarding health questions or concerns on a weekly basis.

The school-nursing contract continues to include training, supervision, and delegation of care to medically fragile students. School nurses work very closely with parents, faculty, and students in providing this vital care to children with special health care needs throughout their regular school year and through summer school programs. The number of and complexity of care required for services to this special health care needs population continues to increase and grow each year.

Parochial Schools

Minimal services are negotiated and provided to parochial schools, i.e. vision and hearing screenings. Additionally, this year, there were 29 school and 2 administrative visits made on behalf of students in parochial schools. All public and parochial school nursing services are negotiated annually and reimbursed according to agreement.

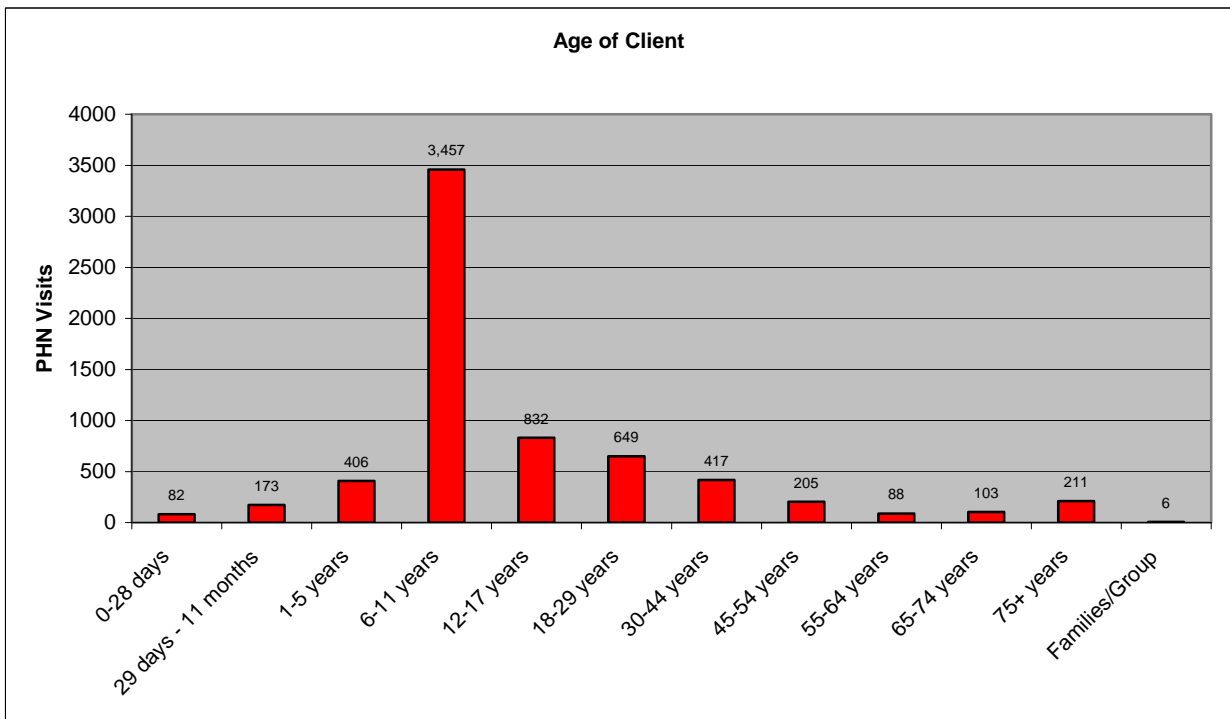
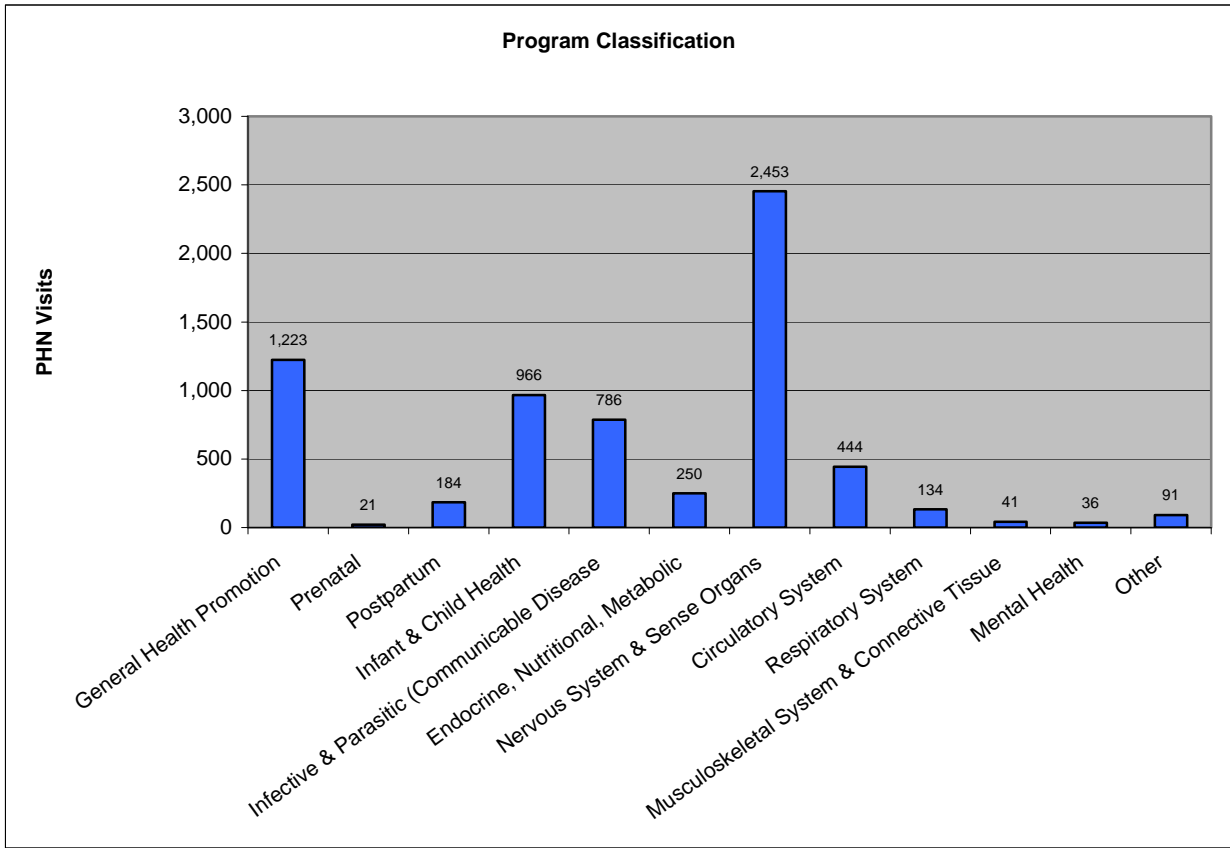
COMMUNITY AND INTERAGENCY ACTIVITIES

Planning with area community service agencies and other health care providers promotes comprehensive services and collaboration in our community. The Neenah Department of Public Health is currently represented in the Alliance for Families, Wisconsin Well Womens' Program Board for Winnebago County, Northeast Region Wisconsin Association of Local Health Departments and Boards of Health (WALHDAB), Winnebago County Tobacco Free Coalition, Fox Valley Public Health Preparedness Consortia, Fox Valley Regional Trauma Advisory Council (RTAC), Fox Cities Healthcare Partnership "Walk To Win", Fox Cities Community Clinic Public Health Advisory Committee, Fox Valley Health Care Forum for Communicable Diseases, Neenah-Menasha Dental Board, NE Wisconsin Immunization Council, Fox Valley Safe KIDS, NJSD Crises Team, Winnebago County Child Death Review Team, Winnebago Area Mortuary Planning Committee, Winnebago Area Special Needs Populations Workgroup, Winnebago Area Antiviral Distribution Workgroup. Health Department staff also volunteered many hours to local non-profit agencies, i.e. Neenah Rotary, COTS, Habitat for Humanity, Youth-Go Board of Directors, etc. Director Smolarek served as past Co-President of the State WALHDAB, Chairperson of the Fox Cities HealthCare Partnership "Walk To Win", and the member of Fox Valley RTAC Injury Prevention Subcommittee. Director Smolarek also served as an elected member of the Fox Valley RTAC Executive Council as the representative from Public Health Administration.

The Department is an approved agency for the provision of Public Health Field Experience for students enrolled in the Bachelor of Science Degree Nursing Program at UW-Oshkosh.

The Department also employed a co-op student from the Neenah High School Diversified Business Class again this year. The Neenah Department of Public Health supports this concept, as an agency that believes that "hands on" work experience is a most valuable building block for students as they plan for their futures.

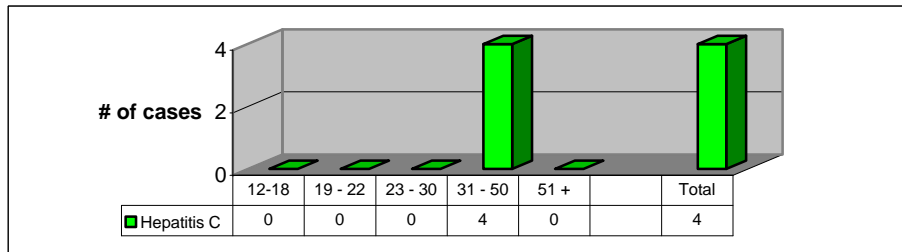
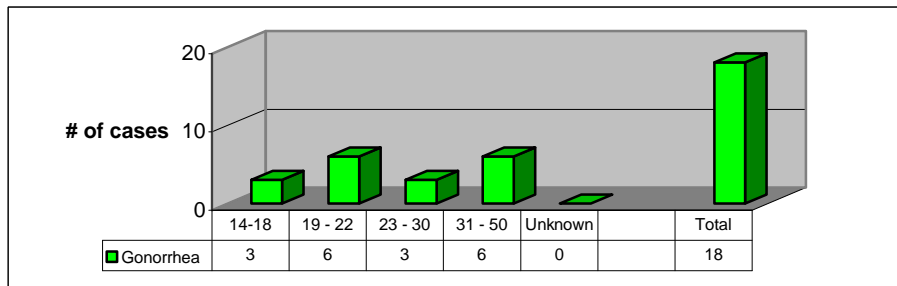
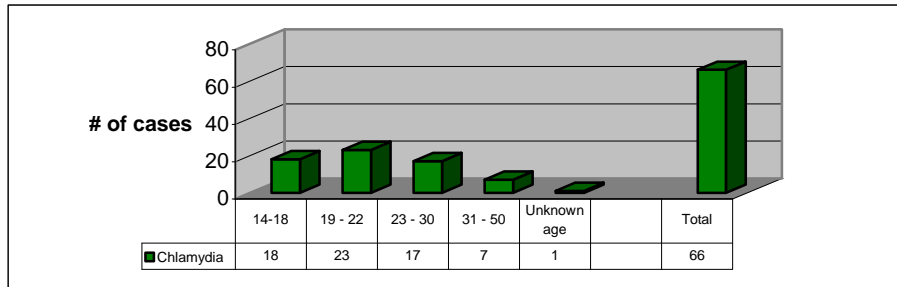

The NHD works in cooperation with the Neenah Police Department in implementing and enforcing the Rabies/Animal Bite Control Program.

SMOKING REGULATIONS IN RESTAURANTS

Effective October 1, 2001, the City of Neenah Common Council adopted Ordinance No. 1164 related to "Smoking Regulation in Restaurant". The City of Neenah Department of Public Health has found implementation of this Ordinance to be a smooth process, with appropriate cooperation and compliance. The City of Neenah Restaurant Guide is available on the City's Web Page and through the Neenah Department of Public Health. Information is available on specific restaurant information and exemptions.

SEALER OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES

The Weights and Measures Program utilizes a City Sealer who inspects and advises local businesses such as grocery stores, hardware stores, filling stations, bakeries, food manufacturers, etc., as to the accuracy of devices that weigh, measure, or dispense products to/for consumers. In addition, the Sealer routinely checks package rates, scanner accuracy, appropriate labeling, and method of sale. This program continues to be effective in ensuring fair and appropriate commodity sales to local residents as a consumer protection service. Revenue collected during the licensing year January - December 2008 grossed \$11,069.00.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

The Neenah Department of Public Health (NDPH) serves as an Agent of the State for the Department of Health and Family Services (DHFS) for Food Safety and Recreational Licensing. This means NDPH enforces applicable state administrative codes for the inspection and licensure of restaurants, hotels, bed & breakfast establishments, public swimming pools including water park attractions, campgrounds, and tattoo and body piercing establishments.

The NDPH also serves as an Agent of the State for the Department of Agricultural, Trade & Consumer Protection (DATCP). This means NDPH enforces applicable state administrative codes for inspection and licensure of retail food establishments, permanent and mobile, including grocery stores, convenience stores mobile units, etc.

The primary goals of these programs are to:

1. Reduce exposure to environmental & safety hazards in public lodging and recreational areas,
2. Reduce death and illness of people,
3. Promote public health to prevent and control exposure to foodborne, waterborne or recreational hazards,
4. Promote awareness of the things people can do to keep their food, water, and recreational resources safe.

In addition to these food service and recreational inspection programs, educational programs, and services are also provided in environmental quality control. This may involve investigation and possible enforcement action in regard to problems related to industrial and residential indoor and outdoor air pollution, lead poisoning as it may affect residents or employees, indoor air contaminants and a variety of neighborhood nuisance situations. Environmental quality control services have a primary emphasis in the maintenance of a clean yard, clean air, a clean neighborhood and ultimately, a clean community.
