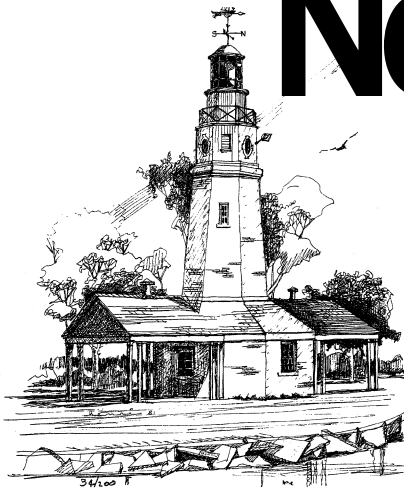

Message from Mayor George Scherck

Last year, Neenah moved from having the 15th highest tax rate out of the 43 largest communities to the 26th highest by reducing the equalized tax rate by 8.1%. Unfortunately, the State fiscal crisis brought a 17% reduction in our shared revenue for 2004, increasing the challenge we face to provide cost-effective services.



My budget goal for this year was to present a budget that increased the tax levy less than the 2.49% that would have been allowed by the so-called tax levy freeze. My 2004 executive budget calls for a levy increase of 1.22%, resulting in an assessed tax rate increase of just .49% and a reduction of the equalized tax rate of 4.11%. This means that the owner of a home assessed at \$100,000 will pay just \$4.62 in additional property taxes for municipal services in 2004.

To accomplish this goal, we had to “right-size” government, reducing the number of employees by 7.5 full time positions. The need is not to stop doing what government should do—planning for the future, enhancing the quality of life, insuring the safety and welfare of all citizens—but rather to carry out these tasks in a smarter, more creative, and more efficient manner. Government has to do what each of you have always done—live within our means.

Government is the only place where services are provided at cost, without profit. The owner of a \$100,000 home pays \$954.00 for police, fire, street lights, snow plowing, garbage pickup, recycling, parks, library, recreation, and health services, which is only \$2.61 a day for municipal services. Our goal is to make those services an even better bargain.

While we could reduce spending by closing parks, shortening library hours, closing the pool earlier, and picking up garbage less often, the key is to find the “invisible cuts” that will reduce expenditures, but not seriously impact major services. We plan to reduce city staff through attrition, reduce personnel costs by holding down salary increases, continue to explore consolidation efforts, and do more with less in every City department.

An Oct. 10th *Post-Crescent* headline said, “Neenah residents laud City’s efforts to control costs,” based on comments received during our first annual Town Meeting. Included in this newsletter is our first Citizen Survey, another opportunity for you to tell us how we are doing. Please take the

Neenah on the move...

The City Council has amended Tax Incremental Financing District #8, the Riverwalk Zone. The City's projected \$1.6 million investment in the Shattuck Riverwalk has already stimulated significant private investment in the Holiday Inn Neenah Riverwalk (formerly the Valley Inn) and the St. James (a new business).

The recent announcement of a \$12 million condominium project is now joined by the possibility of even more significant investment in the district. The amended project plan proposal calls for public investment of \$11.35 million that will create a \$58.6 million tax base addition through the life of the project. All public obligations of TID #8, as amended, will be paid in full from this new increment.

When the district is closed, the tax base created as a result of development in the District will directly benefit all the taxing entities and all future tax revenues will be directly distributed to the City, County, School District, and Fox Valley Technical College.

Since 1982, the City has invested \$30 million in TIF districts in all parts of the community, bringing 143 new businesses, 3,800 jobs and creating \$192 million in additional tax base. That is one way we are working to keep your taxes down.

Property tax due dates

Property taxes may be paid one time in full or in installments. First installment or in-full payments can be made at the Treasurer's Office on the first floor of City Hall or at Associated, Wells Fargo, and M&I banks. All other installment payments must be paid at the Treasurer's Office (open 7:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Mon.-Thu.; 7:30 a.m.-4:00 p.m. Fri.).

Jan. 31 due date for first installment and in-full payments. Payment must be received by 4:30 p.m. on Mon. Feb. 2 or postmarked by Feb. 2.

Mar. 31 due date for second installment. Payment must be received by 4:30 p.m. on Wed. Mar. 31 or postmarked by Mar. 31.

May 31 due date for third installment. Payment must be received by 4:30 p.m. on Mon. May 31 or postmarked by May 31.

July 31 due date for fourth installment. Payment must be received by 4:30 p.m. on Mon. Aug. 2 or postmarked by Aug. 2.

time to fill it out and then mail it, bring it to my office, or drop it off at the Neenah Public Library. By continuing to seek out your opinions and suggestions, we can leave Neenah a better place than we found it.

The Riverwalk will be this generation's legacy to the next generation, increasing our tax base, re-energizing our volunteer spirit, and further enhancing our quality of life.

Mending fences



Lot lines, fences, and border disputes are by far the most frequently discussed subject matter the Department of Community Development deals with when working with City of Neenah residents. It is our hope the following article is useful to those who seek the answer to the most

common property owner question: **What do I own?**

Fences

Fences constitute another source of conflict, none more so than the proverbial “spite fence.” Ugly, oversized, and mean-spirited, the spite fence is a property owner’s version of road rage. Often, spite fences are erected by the loser of a dispute, presumably to blot forever from his sight the neighbor who trumped him, but it’s also meant as a kind of punishment. Spite fences have become so common that 10 states have statutes outlawing them. Even without a statute, however, victims can fight back. Such fences are considered nuisances in every state.

When neighbors share an existing boundary fence, they are co-owners of it.

Lawyers love to tell spite-fence stories. One of the best was recounted by attorney William Lynn. Two Seattle-area brothers were fighting over the division of inherited land. Eventually, one brother built a spite fence – a ghastly cinder block wall with exposed steel supports. The court ordered that the “fence” be destroyed.

“Unfortunately,” says Lynn, “that same guy figured out that although he couldn’t construct a fence taller than 8 feet, he could put up a building as tall as 25 feet. So he built a structure 25 feet high – and 2 feet deep. It was near his pool. He called it a ‘cabana.’”

Perhaps surprisingly, when neighbors share an existing “boundary fence” (a fence straddling a property line), they are, by law, co-owners of it. Neither party may tear the fence down without the other’s permission, and they are equally responsible for its maintenance. (If you choose to put a boundary fence up, however, and are the only party who uses it, you’re solely responsible for it.) Neighbors may make their own agreement in writing, regarding upkeep – e.g., one may agree to let the other choose a high –quality replacement fence if he pays the difference in cost from an ordinary one. But when one neighbor moves, any prior agreement is nullified.

Trees

Besides his house, little may be more beloved to a property owner than a handsome, shade-producing tree—putting trees at the center of some of the most frenzied neighbor disputes. “People go to war over trees,” says California lawyer Sampson.

For the most part, laws regarding trees are unambiguous. For instance, if the complete trunk of a tree stands on your property, the tree belongs to you; if some portion of its boughs and roots reach into your neighbor’s lot, she has the right to trim them – up to the property line only. But she would be wise to engage a professional tree service, since injuring a tree can be a liable offense. And the tree owner must give permission if, in order to perform the work, the arborist must use a ladder, climb the tree, or go onto his property.

Of course, purposely destroying a neighbor’s tree is illegal and could result in criminal charges. Seventeen states allow for fines or jail sentences, and most states allow for double, or even triple, damages. Louisiana judges have awarded extra money for “mental anguish” if the tree has profound sentimental value.

How do courts measure the value of a tree? Compensatory damages reimburse the tree owner for the cost of replacing it, or, if that’s impossible, for diminished property value assessed by experts like arborists, landscape architects, and real estate agents. Replacing a fully mature tree can cost from \$10,000 to \$20,000.

Old or sick trees pose another set of liabilities and costs. As in Jane Doe’s case, most tree owners aren’t liable for the damage a fallen tree might wreak. Generally, if the court believes someone has reason to suspect their tree might cause damage, they are liable, but the courts don’t ask that tree owners be tree experts. And because they rarely pay for maintenance or removal of dangerous trees, insurance companies almost encourage owners to ignore problem trees.

When a tree trunk straddles a property line, it is a “boundary tree” and belongs to both neighbors. Sometimes one will request permission from the other to remove a boundary tree in order to build an addition, or add a pool, deck, or tennis court – but if the issue goes to court, the home owner, writes Cora Jordan, will “likely learn that the judge considers tennis less necessary than he does.”

Junk vehicles bring fines

The open storage or outdoor parking of wrecked or disabled motor vehicles is prohibited. Junk or inoperable vehicles are defined as motor vehicles in such a state of disrepair (physical or mechanical) as to be incapable of self-propulsion or being operated upon the public streets and highways.



When an observation by an inspector or a complaint is received of an inoperable vehicle on private property, an Official Notice will be mailed to the property owner and / or the tenant directing the removal of the junk vehicle by a specified date, usually two to three weeks.

The Inspection Department will work with the property owner and/or the tenant if there is a good faith effort to comply with the Official Notice. An extension may be possible when there is an active effort to repair or remove the vehicle.

When enforcement becomes necessary, a municipal citation will be issued to the vehicle owner if the vehicle is not repaired or removed by the due date. A court date will be set and, if found guilty, a fine of \$162 will be issued. If the junk vehicle is not removed or repaired at this time, the court will issue a daily fine as long as the junk vehicle remains on the property.

Snow removal

The winter season is upon us and we are faced with the task of removing snow from our sidewalks and driveways. We would like to remind all residents of the snow removal regulations in our City.



According to Municipal Code Section 6.04(2) all snow must be removed from the public sidewalk within 24 hours following the cessation of any snow storm. If sidewalks are not shoveled in a timely manner the City may do the work and charge the property owner. The minimum charge is \$68 for each time the City has to remove snow from the sidewalk. The Public Works Department will attempt to contact the owner of the property where the sidewalk needs to be shoveled, but according to Municipal Code the City does not need to contact the property owner prior to cleaning the sidewalk.

Shoveling or blowing snow into the City streets is also a violation of Municipal Code Section 6.04(1) as it may result in unsafe and icy streets. Depositing snow in the street could result in being fined up to \$500 for each violation.

The Public Works Department will make every effort to plow the streets at night or when traffic is at a minimum. This is why no overnight on-street parking is permitted Nov. 1-Apr. 1. All vehicles must be off the streets 2:00 a.m.-5:00 a.m. or they will be ticketed and towed. During heavy snowfalls we may need to plow your street more than once to clean it completely. Hopefully, we will have a mild winter!

Home Address Numbers Critical

The City of Neenah has an ordinance that requires that your address on the house be at least 3 inches by 2 inches, in a contrasting color on or near the front door.

"If your address is not clearly visible from the street, critical time will be lost by emergency vehicles attempting to reach you," said Fire Chief Len Vander Wyst.

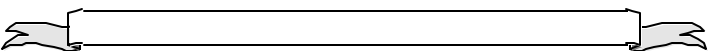

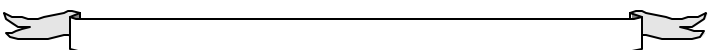
