Message from the Mayor

Dear Friends,

The temperature has dipped to about 32 degrees as I sit in our cottage on Crooked Lake in Mountain, Wisconsin on this Sunday morning in late October. It appears another summer has come to an end, fall has arrived, and snow shoveling season will soon be upon us. That's what makes living here so great for me: The four seasons we enjoy make Wisconsin the place to be.

Our community received good news from our local regional hospital. Dr. Imran Andrabi, President and CEO of ThedaCare, announced that "after much study, we have determined to focus on improving our existing Fox Cities facilities at the current locations."

I was somewhat surprised, but very pleased, with the decision. The CEO and ThedaCare Board of Trustees listened, evaluated, and determined that the path forward is to enhance their current campuses in Neenah and Appleton.

Our senior City staff and I spent many hours discussing the history, impact, and legacy the Hospital has on the community. Access to quality healthcare was, and is, a top priority for our community. We stressed the importance of keeping this world-class facility in its current location. I am committed to ensuring that the City will support ThedaCare through infrastructure improvements and campus upgrades to protect top-notch healthcare services for the future.

This quality regional hospital is so important to our community for many reasons: the economic impact they bring, access to a Level II Trauma Center, the Children's Hospital, and the many highly regarded surgeons, doctors, and staff. When minutes matter, having a quality emergency facility like

ThedaCare, combined with excellent pre-hospital care from the paramedics of Gold Cross Ambulance, can make the difference in critical lifesaving decisions.



ThedaCare's commitment to this community is appreciated. And I believe that by working together, we can enhance the current location for the next generation.

Another project that will be completed by the time you receive this newsletter is the City budget. My goals are simple: To improve our quality core services, keep the property taxes you pay affordable, set fees at or below current levels, evaluate our services and focus on how those can be enhanced while staying within the revenue and expenditure goals of the budget, and to pay off more debt than we take on each year, which we delivered once again.

Our budget is just over \$24.5 million dollars per year, which is supported by a tax levy of \$13,424,960. Including debt service, the budget is just over \$16.8 million dollars, an increase of just over \$232,000 over 2017.

Street assessments are on my radar and I would like your opinion. We currently assess homeowners, whose streets are being reconstructed, with part of the cost. We now bill homeowners on each side of the street one-third of the cost, with the City paying the remaining third. This means a property owner could face a bill of \$3,000 to \$4,000 when the street is redone. We allow a 5-year payment plan. However, in many cases, this cost puts a large financial burden on the homeowner.

The City Council is reviewing alternatives

PAYMENTS

Escrow Checks: If you are paying with an escrow check, please make sure your check is properly endorsed. Checks with missing signatures will not be accepted.

Credit card/e-check payments: For your convenience, you may pay your tax bill online at <u>www.ci.neenah.wi.us</u> or by calling 1-844-309-5946. Service fees will apply on these transactions.

NSF checks: There is a \$35 fee charged on all returned (non-sufficient funds) checks.

Receipts: If payment is made by mail and you would like a receipt, please enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope with your payment.

REFUND POLICY

If your mortgage escrow check is larger than the amount of your tax bill, the full amount of your check will be applied to the tax bill and a refund check will be issued within 30 days.

Cash refunds of \$50.00 or less will be given at the Treasurer's office. The designated financial institutions listed will issue refunds immediately for payments over the full tax bill. Identification or depository account may be required.

Did you receive your LOTTERY & GAMING CREDIT?

If you **do not** have a Lottery/Gaming credit on your tax bill, you may still be eligible.

To qualify for the credit, your primary residence must be located in Wisconsin and be owner-occupied on January 1 of the tax year.

This is a State of Wisconsin program that is facilitated by the City of Neenah.

Forms are available online at www.revenue.wi.gov/forms/lottery or in the Treasurer's Office.

Pet Licenses

All dogs and cats over 5 months of age are required to be licensed annually in the City of Neenah.

Licenses can be purchased at the Treasurer's Office.

A valid, current rabies certificate is required to issue a license.

Fees:

- \$6 for altered pets
- \$11 for unaltered pets
- A \$5 late fee will be imposed if the license is purchased after March 31, 2018

Support the NPD K9 Program

Prior to the inception of the Neenah Police Department K9 program, the average number of drug contacts per year was approximately 92. Since K9 Cedric started patrolling the streets, that number has jumped to a high of 258 drug contacts per year.

Drugs are in our community and we need partners like Cedric to help find them. In just five years, K9 Cedric is credited with eradicating over 50 pounds of drugs off our city streets, including one of the state's largest methamphetamine seizures.

The police department has been given permission to expand the K9 program, allowing us to field two K9s. Our goal is to get one K9 trained and on patrol by the spring of 2018. After Cedric retires another K9 will be trained for patrol.

We would like to partner with you in ridding our community of drugs. Without your support, our \$230,000 fund-raising goal would not be possible.



Roundabout Safety

Our tenured officers remember responding to dozens of serious car accidents at formerly signal-controlled intersections, like Winneconne Avenue and Green Bay Road. Those broadside accidents often sent occupants to the hospital. With roundabouts, serious injuries are rare.

Though serious injuries have been avoided, there are still many preventable crashes in roundabouts due to improper driver actions. There are a few simple rules every driver must follow to ensure safety:

Roundabout safety, continued

- Follow the designated lane movements. Don't go straight in a turn-only lane; don't turn in a straightonly lane.
- Don't drive alongside large trucks.
 Stay behind them.
- Slow down.
- Watch for pedestrians and bicyclists in the crosswalks.
- Don't enter the roundabout if traffic is approaching from the left in any lane.
 In addition to reducing the cost and harm of injury accidents, roundabouts

are very cost effective. No more burned -out stoplights, no more power poles knocked down by large vehicles. Roundabouts are now an integral part of Neenah's traffic flow so let's use them properly and keep everyone safe!

Neenah-Menasha Fire Rescue

Neenah-Menasha Fire Rescue places a strong emphasis on fire prevention and safety education. October is dedicated to bringing this information into the schools. This year, the Fire Prevention Team delivered fire safety information to 2,534 children in the first, second, and third

grades in the Neenah and Menasha Joint School districts (photo, above right).

Santa Float

The Santa Float is an annual tradition in Neenah (and now Menasha), which started in the early 1950s.

The Santa Float will again make its way through the cities of Neenah and

and proposals to change street assessment policy. Alternatives include:

- 10% for each side of the street, with the balance paid by City borrowing.
- Wheel Tax on vehicles, as some local communities have done.
- Transportation Fee that would be paid by ALL property owners annually—a flat fee of approximately \$40 per year on residential properties, a slightly higher fee on small businesses, and a higher fee on large retail businesses. Consequently, a residential property would pay \$800.00 over a twenty year period.

I want to stress these are only being talked about at this time. Clearly a change would impact those who recently paid the assessment. I would like to hear your thoughts on pursuing a change on street assessments. Please feel free to contact me by email at dkaufert@ci.neenah.wi.us or go to the City's website www.ci.neenah.wi.us and click on "Contact Us". You may also contact any of the Aldermen; they are interested in your opinion on this as well. We need to hear from you – this issue impacts all of us at some time.

And finally, the "Loop the Lake Trestle Project" has begun construction, which will continue through winter. A ribboncutting ceremony is planned for early April. These bridges across the north and south branches of the Fox River will enhance and further unite the Loop the Lake trail, providing a 3.2 mile trail to be used by many.

Loop the Lake

The Loop the Lake project came in within budget and bids were awarded to Pfeifer Brothers Construction in October. Construction is expected to begin in November and be completed in June 2018. Stay tuned for more information.

Winter recreation

Winter provides a magnificent opportunity to get out and enjoy our parks and nature. Discover landscapes and formations that otherwise cannot be seen with foliage on the trees. Whether it is cross-country skiing (groomed trails at Riverside, Memorial and Southview Parks), ice skating (Green, Washington and Memorial Parks), snowshoeing just about anywhere, or sledding (hills at Memorial, Washington, Quarry and Island Parks), get outside and take in the beauty of winter!

Building ice rinks

The best condition to build ice is when there is at least 2 inches of frost in the ground and the temperature is below 17 degrees. If there is too little frost and if the temperature is warmer than 17 degrees, applying water can actually draw the frost out of the ground.

Ice skating

Supervised ice rinks with warming shelters are located at three sites around the City of Neenah.

Green Park (337 Columbian Ave.)

All shelters close when the combination of temperature and wind is unsafe to skate/sled/ski.

Hockey

- Washington Park: Half of rink during all open shelter hours. Skaters with hockey sticks will only be allowed on the north end of the Washington rink.
- Green & Memorial parks: Hockey allowed when recreational skaters are not present.

X-Country skiing: Groomed crosscountry ski trails are maintained (when snow conditions are favorable) at Memorial, Southview and Riverside parks. Skiing is allowed in any City of Neenah park.
