MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Hello Friends and Neighbors,

It's a new year and a time of transitions and new opportunities for many of you. Here at the City of Neenah, we are also experiencing some major transitions. On January 5, our new Neenah Menasha Fire Rescue Chief officially assumed his duties for both the cities of Neenah and Menasha. Chief Travis Teesch is joining us from having served at the City of Watertown as their Chief. Originally from the Fox Valley, he is happy to be returning to the area. His full-time career began in 1999 with the Kaukauna Fire Department where he attained the role of Assistant Chief. As we gladly welcome Chief Teesch to our team at the City of Neenah, we also say goodbye to Chief Kevin Kloehn who served for nearly 32 years beginning in 1992 at the City of

Menasha before our two cities combined fire services in 2003. Chief Kloehn had served as the NMFR Chief since 2016, and we wish him all the best in this new chapter.

Another major upcoming departure from the City of Neenah is our soon to be retired Director of Information Services. Joe Wenninger. I've had many conversations with Director Wenninger regarding the transformation of technology from his perspective since he began at the city in 1985. In his words, "The early days were simple as the IT environment (at the city) consisted of five workstations (no PCs) and one printer connected to a midrange server." Contrast that with what he now oversees: 350 devices (PCs, smartphones, and tablets), 46 to 50 print devices, connected to 9 physical and 82 virtual servers. Add to that list security cameras, wireless hotspots, and electronically controlled door access as well as electronic communication, internet access, and the ever-growing threat of cyber security attacks, and you can see that Director Wenninger has had a very dynamic and very busy career at the city. After thirty-nine years of service, he will be retiring in early May, and we also wish him the best with his future endeavors. Our search for a new Information Services Director began in January.

Another significant departure from our city leadership team will be the retirements of two of our elected officials. Both indicated their intention to retire at the end of their terms in April of 2024. John Skyrms, representing the first district since 2020, has provided a very

valuable and dedicated presence on City Council. John served on the Finance and Personnel Committee, the Business Improvement District Board, the Joint Review Board for Tax Incremental Financing Districts, and the Committee on Rules. His calm and thoughtful presence on the Council will be greatly missed.

When I asked our City Clerk to provide me with the service history of Alderman Todd Stevenson, she pulled out a three-page spreadsheet. There would be no way to adequately cover all that Ald. Stevenson has done during his 34 years of service to the City of Neenah. From having served on 10 individual committees, commissions, and countless ad hoc groups, to serving as Council President for 28 of his 34 years of service, he has epitomized the role of community servant

leader. The opportunity to have worked with Alderman Stevenson on council, for the 8 years I served before running for mayor, was a great honor and privilege, and I personally appreciated his thoughtful and deliberate approach. He provided valuable guidance and insight into the history of how things have worked and how to improve them throughout his long tenure, and he will also be greatly missed.

As we're reviewing transitions within our valued personnel at the city it also seems appropriate to mention the closure of two of our longstanding Tax Incremental Financing Districts (TIDs 5 and 6) as this also marks a significant milestone in the City's on-going story. As we talked through how we would recognize these closures and we researched the



very beginning of the use of TIF to encourage economic growth, it was inspirational to look at the example of former Mayor Marigen Carpenter.

The concept of tax incremental financing was new when Mayor Carpenter was elected in 1982. She received valuable input and education on this new tool from the Wisconsin League of Municipalities, and despite facing some opposition when she advocated to implement this new idea, she persevered and the city has continued to greatly benefit from her efforts. The entire team of council members and staff at that time clearly contributed to the work that was necessary to help those early efforts succeed, and that continues to be the case today.

We're indebted to our former mayors, former and current aldermen, and former and current staff members who are constantly striving for excellence and seeking out ways to positively contribute to future success

of the City of Neenah. I would be remiss if I didn't mention the business owners and community members who have invested their time, talents, and resources to help our community grow. Thank you for working with us to make Neenah a great place to call home. We work best when we work together with the betterment of all of our community in mind.

Consider a Rain Garden This Spring

Residents may have noticed that in various locations throughout the city, including the Washington Park area, bioretention basins have been incorporated into the landscape. These additions facilitate water filtration by utilizing native plants with deep root systems. This natural filtration and absorption process involves plants and microbes that effectively remove pollutants, lessen soil erosion, and minimize nutrient loss. Unlike typical concrete surfaces, which inhibit water absorption into the ground system, these bioretention basins promote infiltration benefits. This spring, you can achieve similar benefits on your property by incorporating a rain garden into your landscaping!

WHERE TO BEGIN?

If planning a rain garden project, the first step is to call the Diggers Hotline at 811 or 800-242-8511. You can also visit the website call811.com to get more information. It is equally important to contact your local municipality to obtain any required permits to ensure your project is within the local code ordinance. Once you have all this information and approval, you are ready to start planning your rain garden project!

PROJECT PLANNING AND DESIGN

Planning and installing a rain garden for your landscape requires consideration of various factors, including the garden's size and depth, its positioning relative to the sloped area, its distance from nearby building foundations, and its distance from property lines. It is important to carefully choose the appropriate soil and plant native vegetation that will not only enhance the area's appearance but, most importantly, prevent erosion, regulate moisture, and promote adequate water filtration and root aeration of the soil. During the planning phase of any landscape project, it is important to consider the ongoing maintenance requirements.

Benefits of a Rain Garden

- Aesthetic Rain gardens enhance the visual appeal of a landscape by incorporating diverse native plant species and creating vibrant color, using naturally wet areas of your yard.
- Biodiversity A rain garden filled with native Wisconsin vegetation fosters an ecosystem for microbes, insects, birds, and pollinators to thrive.
- Recharge Groundwater -Paved impermeable surfaces divert and prevent surface water from draining into ground layers. Rain gardens direct surface water to drain naturally into the soil.

Given Neenah's proximity to interconnected water systems, it's crucial that residents act to prevent contamination, especially since the sewer systems drain into these waterways. The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources reports that rain garden plants capture and filter 30% more water than a regular lawn.

Spring Yard Waste Collection Starting April 9, the Department of Public Works will be collecting yard waste each week for 5 weeks. Collection will be the day following your regularly scheduled refuse collection.

Unwanted or obsolete computer equipment, speakers, DVD players, VCRs, cell phones, televisions, microwaves, appliances, dehumidifiers, etc. can be dropped off for recycling. Fees may apply.

Officer Josh Peterson Named New Behavioral Health Officer

The Neenah Police Department recently implemented a new Behavioral Health Officer (BHO) position. Officer Josh Peterson, who has been with the department since 2008, became the first BHO in September 2023. The position is responsible for responding to behavioral health-related calls as well as supporting individuals with mental health issues and people who are working through a crisis. The BHO is assigned to the patrol division, but the primary focus is behavioral health-related calls.

BHO Peterson collaborates with Winnebago County Human Services and other outside partner agencies to develop a support plan for specific need(s) of individuals and their families. One of the main goals for this position is to reduce calls for police services related to mental health crises. The BHO also

helps bridge the gap for individuals between short-term acute care and long-term care.

Traditionally, a patrol response includes an officer who must go call-to-call while other calls are also pending. This does not leave much time for individual attention and care to a specific behavioral health issue. With this new position, BHO Peterson can invest more time with individuals to provide support through a difficult time, as well as build a positive working relationship with them and be an advocate for them. Mental health is health, and the Neenah Police Department is grateful for the opportunity to provide this service to the community.

Did you know?

51.35% of taxpayers paid their real estate tax bill in December.

The City of Neenah collects the property taxes for three other taxing entities (Winnebago County, Neenah Joint School District (NJSD) and Fox Valley Technical college), as well as for the City of Neenah. Of the entire tax bill, 41.1% stays with the City of Neenah, and the remaining portions are sent to the respective entities as shown in the graph at right.

The median home value in the City of Neenah for 2023 is \$278,000. For a home assessed at \$213,850 in 2022, which was revalued with a 30% increase in 2023 to \$278,000, the tax bill breakdown is shown at right.

In this instance, the overall annual property tax bill decreased by almost \$43.


NM FIRE RESCUE

Open Burning

Under city ordinance, you are only allowed to burn in a fire pit if you have a burning permit and follow the specific guidelines of the burning ordinance. Bonfires are prohibited. People who obtain permits are allowed to burn from 4pm to midnight, seven days per week. The purpose of this ordinance is to allow residents to have a recreational fire in a safe manner. Bonfires, burning of leaves, brush or garbage are prohibited.

Fire Permit and **Renewal Process**

Fire permits can now be obtained on the City of Neenah's website under Finance Department or in the office. An electronic application is filled out and the email confirmation is the permit. If you don't have an email address a receipt will be printed for you, this can be done in the office or mailed in with a self-addressed stamped envelope. The cost of the 2024 fire permit is \$17.

Payment and an application can be submitted on the City of Neenah's website. The license and tag will be mailed when processed. Dog and cat licenses for 2024 may also be purchased at City Hall's Treasurer's office and are due by Sun, Mar 31. A valid rabies vaccination certificate is required.

Neutered/Spayed Cat/Dog: \$8 Unneutered/Unspayed Cat/Dog: \$13

A \$5 late fee is assessed for each pet licensed after Mar 31, 2024. For any new pet acquired after Mar 31, the late fee will be waived.

Boat Launch Parking Permit

Boat Launch Parking permits for trailer parking at Doty Park Launch and Rec Park Launch are sold online. or an account is created in the Finance Department at City Hall. There is no physical sticker to put on your trailer, Parking Permits now go by the towing vehicle license plate (2 allowed per permit). Creating an account will allow you to maintain, update, and change towing vehicles as needed. Festival Foods will no longer be selling Boat Launch Parking Permits. Permits are now able to be purchased as of Jan 1 and good through Dec 31 each year. Contact the Finance Department with any questions 920-886-6144.

Fire Hydrant Flushing **Notice** April-May

The majority of the flushing is performed from 7am-3pm, beginning in the north of the City and working south. You may experience low water pressure or discolored water. The discolored water is safe and is caused by naturally occurring minerals being stirred up in the water mains. Residents are urged to avoid water use during flushing, especially for laundry, as it may stain clothing. If you see discolored water, run cold water in a non-aerated faucet until the water runs clear.

The inconvenience should not last more than a day. If problems persist, call 920-886-6180 or 920-886-6191.

Polls are open 7am to 8pm. Sample ballots will be posted to the City website and in the Clerk's office as soon as available.

You can request an absentee ballot via <u>www.myvote.wi.gov</u>. For questions or problems requesting an absentee ballot via www.myvote.wi.gov please call us at 920-886-6110.

Absentee ballots may be returned by one of the following options:

- Mail Absentee ballots come with return postage. USPS recommends mailing at least one week prior to Election Day to assure on-time delivery.
- In-person directly to the Clerk's Office – 211 Walnut St., during regular business hours. Absentee ballots must be returned by the voter named on the ballot.

Disabled voters may use an agent to return their ballot in-person to the Clerk's Office.

Remember when voting absentee, the certificate envelope must be:

- Signed by the voter
- Signed by a witness. Witnesses can be a spouse, a neighbor, a sibling, etc., at least 18 years old.
 - Include printed witness name
 - Include witness address


MONSTER SHARKS: THE PALEONTOLOGICAL HISTORY OF **JAWS**

From movies like Jaws and The Meg, sharks are popularly viewed as man-eating monsters. But surprisingly, from the docile whale shark to the tiny,

parasitic cookie cutter shark, modern species show a large variation in size and lifestyle. Even though today many are the apex predators in their environment, sharks haven't always been the top dog of the sea. In this presentation, paleontologist Dr. Joseph Frederickson will take you on a journey to meet some of the unusual ancestors of today's sharks.
